Last month people from across the world showed their support for England's Black players after they were subjected to another night of racist abuse on social media following defeat in the European Championship final. Gareth Southgate, England's Football Manager, said that ensuring his players were supported after the penalty heartbreak was "top of his thinking" in the hours after the final. His style, approach and thoughtfulness as a leader has led to sustainable results on the pitch as well as a positive impact off it.

Southgate led and continues to lead with purpose and investing in his team showing that leadership matters off the pitch as much as on it: it's who you are behind the scenes that counts as much as who you are in the heat of action. But what we find defines his legacy of leadership, is the central tenet of empathy.

"My approach would be to have empathy with people. As a coach, you always have to be there to support the person - improving them as a player becomes secondary to a degree. But if a player feels that you respect them and you want to help them, then they are more likely to listen to you and follow you." - Southgate in 2017




