

Black History is About More Than Oppression

October is Black History Month (BHM) in the UK. All too often Black history is centred upon Black trauma. While it is important to acknowledge and understand the legacy of slavery, it should not be the single narrative told. A plethora of Black histories exist but have for too long been marginalised, or erased altogether, not just from the annals of history but also our children's education.

The US State of Florida and its state legislature for example have been on a crusade to rewrite education laws, policies and academic standards that restricts the ways in which race and history is taught.

These renewed efforts to erase Black history are detrimental if we are to move forward and rebuild equitable systems by design. It is these Black histories which tell us the stories of Black brilliance, innovation, culture, identity, community, joy and belonging. It is time we redress our knowledge gaps and accept Black history as History.

Race in the UK Workplace: The Intersectional Experience

This research found Black, Bangladeshi, and Pakistani women in the UK were the furthest behind on pay and labour force participation. This suggests UK companies struggle to simultaneously achieve gender and ethnic diversity. Read more here.




How Hair Discrimination Affects Black Women at Work

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
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
